- Invest in and strengthen independent services

At 100,000 signatures this petition will be considered for debate in Parliament

# **Deep Dive Progress**

# **Diagnosis of Gynaecological Conditions**

We have received a great response to our <u>ongoing gynaecological survey</u> and are currently contacting some of those respondents who said they are willing to discuss their case further with us.

Events are also being organised in the community to get more feedback. One event called 'Cycles and Stories' has already been organised for early evening on September 30th in Burton on Trent and has 15 women signed up. We would like to thank Gulsoom Aslam for all her valuable help with this.

## Mental Health - Staying Well Research

Work on the Mental Health – Staying Well Deep Dive has got off to a good start with Dave and Emma investigating local services and promoting the survey to



contacts. Following attendance at a Community & Membership Engagement Group, they have met with Ian Saberton, Service Lead for the Mental Health and Social Inclusion Hub and Primary Care Mental Health, to expand their contacts, especially in the South West. Emma also attended the Mental Health Forum organised by the VCSE Healthy Communities Alliance to gather more feedback.

Emma and Kelly have also been involved in Quality Visits to Harplands Hospital, where contact was made with women on Ward Three and the Parent and Baby Unit. Emma has also attended the North Staffordshire Combined Healthcare Service User and Carer Council this month to hear more feedback on mental health services in North Staffordshire.

SURVEY UPDATE We have now removed the survey condition that you must have been discharged from NHS services in the last 2 years. You are now eligible for the survey if: you live in Staffordshire, are over 18 and have had poor mental health in the past. Take the survey here.

We are actively looking for local groups who support people with their mental health to help us get in touch with more people for our survey. There is a financial incentive to groups to help with this – see information on the **Engagement Fund** below.

# **Enter and View Visits and Holmcroft Report**

In July, Chris Sherwood and volunteer Val Emery completed an Enter and View Visit to **Lanrick House** Care Home. We also published our first Pharmacy Enter and View report for Whitehouse Pharmacy which Chris, Kelly and Kate visited in May.

We also published a report containing feedback about patients' experiences with appointments and prescriptions at Holmcroft GP Surgery. The surgery helped to design the survey and very kindly texted a link to patients, as well as supplying paper copies in the practice waiting room. We had a huge response with over 800 surveys completed over several weeks.

Thank you to over 800 patients at Holmcroft GP surgery who responded to our survey and told us about their experiences of:

- Access to Appointments and
- Prescription Renewal

# **July Feedback**

42 responses were collected from across the County as follows:






Please note that the feedback does NOT cover Enter & View Visits nor responses to Surveys.

## **Service Categories**

Hospital Services had most responses (26) followed by Primary Care Services (20). The other responses were for Mental Health and Learning Difficulties (4), Community Health Services (3), Other (3), Patient Transport (2) and Social Care Services (1).





#### Under Hospital Services

the responses mainly covered Outpatients (5), Inpatient care (4) and Emergency Department including A&E (4). Radiology/x-ray/MRI/CT scans, and diagnostic and screening services had 2 comments each.

In **Primary Care** the responses were mainly about GP services (18) with 2 comments about dentistry.

Mental Health and Learning Disabilities covered Autism Services (2), Community and specialist Mental Health Services (1) and Mental Health Other (1).


Community Health Services responses included Community Hospitals, Other and continuing care. Patient Transport had two comments about Emergency Ambulances. "Other" mentions Advocacy services, Benefits/DWP and Equipment Services. Social Care Services had one response about care packages.

#### **Themes**

Various **Treatment and Care** themes were mentioned 64 times, and within this area, the topics mentioned most often were:

- Quality of treatment (9)
- Follow-on treatment and continuity of care (8)
- Diagnosis (6)
- Person-centred care (5)
- Waiting for appointments or treatment /waiting times (3)
- Communication with patients treatment explanation / verbal advice (3)
- Consent, choice, user involvement and being listened to (3)

#### Satisfaction by Theme





The responses under Access (21) were all about "Access to Services", under **Behaviours** (13) all were "Staff Attitudes and Performance", and for **Administration** (10) most comments (3) related to "Administration (Letters records/results)".

## **Positive Feedback in July**

One person said they had gone to Cauldwell Children for their child's (autism) assessment, and they were brilliant. They gave you a report following the assessment and they also gave a second report that the child was able to read. Following the assessment they had a further meeting with the family.





"An excellent service from GP to UHNM from initial diagnosis to follow up appointments" (regarding Wolverhampton Road and UHNM).

## **Demographics**





We reached 8 carers and one new parent. We spoke with at least 5 members of the LGBTIA+ community. Of those who specified an ethnicity, all were white.

There were 4 people with a long-term condition and 8 who considered they had a disability. 2 people had hearing impairments (1 was tinnitus). Other conditions mentioned included cancer (4, 2 with breast cancer, 1 with pancreatic), 4 people with mental health conditions, 2 around gender dysphoria, 4 with physical or mobility impairment, 2 with arthritis, 1 with learning disabilities, 2 with ADHD, 3 with Autism, 2 with Diabetes, 2 with chronic pain and 1 mentioning COPD. Other conditions mentioned are: Crohn's, prostatectomy, ulcerated foot, spinal injury, hypertension, high cholesterol, Fibromyalgia, a fall, Parkinson's, spinal nerve problem, low bone density, speech difficulties and ear nose and throat problems.



# **Engagement & Signposting**

## **Support for the Deaf Community**

There were several activities around supporting the Deaf Community this month: Emma attended the dDeaflinks Community Connect Event at Birches Head, a meeting was held with Deborah Lush from the group Deafinately Women who operate in Derbyshire, and a further meeting was held to discuss potential seed funding for a group of young British Sign Language users to establish their own group.



#### **Other Events**

Jackie attended a Patient Participation Group at Weeping Cross. Emma attended the AGM for PEGiS (Parent Engagement Group in Stoke) and "Trans Talk" at Project 93. There was less general engagement work this month due to staff holidays and an increasing focus on the Deep Dives.

# **Healthwatch England News**

In July, Healthwatch England published a blog about how "<u>Trans and non-binary people face hurdles at every stage of primary care | Healthwatch</u>" along with the accompanying report: "<u>What trans and non-binary people told us about GP</u> care".

#### Issues included:

- changing their gender marker on GP records
- losing access to old medical records
- keeping up with sex-based medical care (like cervical or prostate care)
- being misgendered
- being referred for gender reassignment surgery
- receiving Hormone Replacement Therapy both during the wait for assessment and after surgery

Healthwatch England also published a more general <u>article</u> and <u>report</u> about **"The choice gap: do patients get the choices they want from GP care?"**. This <u>article</u> highlights what your rights are at the GP.

On their website, you can also read more about <u>the impact of Healthwatch</u> and their simple and straightforward <u>advice articles</u> about health and social care services.





## **Social Media**

Under local services and events we posted about the <u>new Mental Health crisis</u> <u>centre</u> opening at St George's Hospital in Stafford and the Talking Therapies bus, a new monthly support group in Burton for Neurodivergent women, a 'Minds Matter' event in Uttoxeter, the CTRL+ You fun events for young people in Tamworth and Stafford, and NHS Lung Cancer Screening coming to Burton in August and September.

We also shared details of: a <u>blood pressure survey</u>, the <u>Diabetic Eye Screening Programmes Survey</u> (ends 30<sup>th</sup> September), Carers' UK State of Caring Survey 2025, and the <u>Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment Consultation</u> (ends 1<sup>st</sup> September).

We also raised awareness of National Bereaved Parents Awareness Day and local charity A Child of Mine, Alcohol Awareness Week (and service Alcohol ChangeUK), Samaritans' Awareness Day, National Schizophrenia Awareness Day, and National Coproduction Week (including a Community Engagement Workshop) as well as changes to the Cervical Cancer screening and vaccination updates. The latter covered getting protection from measles for family holidays and festivals, changes to childhood vaccination schedules, vaccinations for pregnant women and how RSV Vaccines have reduced hospital admissions for RSV for older adults and newborns.
